1. Your friend drops her book. What should you do? A) Pick it up for her B) Walk away
2. You see your neighbor outside. What should you do? A) Say hello B) Hide
3. Two friends want to use the red crayon. What should they do? A) Take turns B) Fight over it
4. You have two cookies and your friend has none. What should you do? A) Share one cookie B) Eat both cookies
5. A classmate is sitting alone at lunch. What should you do? A) Ask them to sit with you B) Ignore them
6. Your friend built a tower with blocks. What should you say? A) That looks great! B) Mine is better
7. Three children want to play a game but one child is left out. What should you do? A) Ask the child to join the game B) Start playing without them
8. Your classmate is carrying a heavy bag. What should you do? A) Offer to help carry it B) Run ahead
9. You accidentally bump into a friend. What should you do? A) Say you are sorry B) Laugh and run away
10. A new student joins your class and does not know where things are. What should you do? A) Show them where to find things B) Let them figure it out alone

10. A (*Helping someone new is welcoming and kind.*)
